Wards	Can select to run in whatever ward you wish. Do not have to live in the ward. Neebing, Red River, McIntyre Current River, Westford, Northwood, Mckellar	At-large is similar to running as the Mayor. Elected by all voters.
Election Spending	\$5,000 plus 20 cents for each voter in the ward (\$15,000)	\$7,500 plus 20 cents for each voter (\$23,500)

What do you need to do to campaigns as a ward councilor that might be different than running at large What helps a person decide whether they want to run at large or in a ward?	<ul> <li>Focus campaign regarding ward issues</li> <li>Knock on doors</li> <li>Can do alone</li> <li>Costs for advertising less – signs</li> <li>Generally well known</li> <li>Hold open houses throughout campaign period in specific areas of the ward</li> <li>Feeling that the ward constituents need a stronger voice</li> <li>Ward meeting get the pulse of residents</li> <li>Listen to concern and bring them forward to Council for Consideration and action</li> <li>Able to work on one area of the city – can walk it and talk to constituents</li> <li>Broader perspective of issues that impact the ward</li> <li>Feeling that you have an ability to win</li> <li>Less money required</li> <li>Historically where you have lived</li> <li>Time</li> <li>Satisfaction with incumbent</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Look at city wide issues</li> <li>Cannot knock doors</li> <li>Require a campaign team</li> <li>Have to promote across the city</li> <li>Need to have name recognition</li> <li>Difficult to host open houses due to size city</li> <li>Generally at large Councillors do not hold ward meetings</li> <li>At large, generally, deal with city wide issues but also get calls on ward issues.</li> <li>They work with larger community issues</li> </ul>
